

CASE STUDY

ST BOTOLPH WITHOUT BISHOPSGATE

St Botolph without Bishopsgate is a grade 2 listed Church of England church located near Liverpool Street in the City of London.

Before:

- The church was 1st mentioned in 1212 and survived the great fire of London in 1666.
- It was rebuilt between 1724 and 1729.
- During the construction of the church, the foundations of the original Anglo Saxon church were discovered.
- The organ which is located inside the church was installed in 1764.
- It was granted grade 2 listed status in 1950.
- Romantic poet John Keats was baptised in the church in 1795.



During:

J E Putney & Sons were awarded the contract to carry out the restoration of the lime plastering works to the internal masonry walls throughout the church. 3 coat haired lime plaster was used to restore the churches original appearance.

Trade Techniques and Attention to detail:

Restoration of internal masonry walls throughout the church.

3 coat haired lime plaster was use to ensure the grade 2 listing status was adhered to.

Lime plaster allows the building to breath decreasing the chances of cracking or damp.
